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Technical Paper 1981:2 Questionnaire Continuity Guide

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The British Election Study (BES) at the University of Essex was started as a research project in 1974 to continue the series of election surveys previously conducted by David Butler and Donald Stokes. The Essex University project is wholly funded by the Social Science Research Council. Mr Ivor Crewe and Professor Bo Sarlvik have been Directors since 1974. Dr David Robertson (now at St. Hugh's College, Oxford) joined the project as a Director in 1975. At different stages in the project the Directors have been assisted by the following Senior Research Officers: Mr (now Professor) J.Alt, Mr A.Fox, Mr N.Day and Mr R.MacDermid. The British Election Study has conducted interview surveys of eligible voters following the general elections of February 1974, October 1974 and May 1979. The series of studies also includes a mail questionnaire survey conducted after the Referendum on Britain's membership of the EEC in 1975. In accordance with the SSRC grant conditions, the data gathered by these surveys are deposited with the SSRC Survey Archive at the University of Essex and made available to academic researchers for further analysis.

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This technical paper has been constructed to provide a comprehensive guide to the text of questions selected for interviews conducted in the series of election surveys, from 1963 to present. Not all questions were asked in each and every study undertaken in that period. The continuity guide enables the researcher to select variables that can be

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analysed overtime. As is shown in the following pages, questions have been grouped under sectional headings. These are further subdivided to give more detail of particular aspects dealt with. The questions themselves are presented on the left-hand side of the page and in several cases are preceeded by a phrase in block letters. This was not included within the actual text but provided the interviewer with an instruction, dependent upon the respondent's answer to the preceeding question, as to which question to proceed to. Inclusion of this instruction in the guide gives the reader some indication of the selective processes necessarily undertaken whilst the interview was in progress.

On the left-hand side of the page each question is followed by a row of figures, and in many cases accompanied by symbols (referred to in the section entitled 'symbols'). These signify variations in question wording in the individual interview surveys conducted after the general elections. From the 1963 to the 1970 columns, the question numbers denote those questions asked of respondents in the Butler and Stokes Panel series. The following columns refer to surveys conducted by the British Election Study.

The surveys carried out by the British Election Study at the University of Essex are described in the project's Technical Paper 1981:1.

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It should be noted that the questionnaire types used in the October 1974 study were designated as questionnaire types 'A', 'B' and 'C'. Type 'B' is the most comprehensive version and was used for respondents in the cross-section sample who had not been interviewed in the February 1974 survey. The 'A' questionnaire was used for respondents in the cross-section sample who had been interviewed in February 1974 and is a somewhat abridged version of the 'B' questionnaire. The 'C' questionnaire was used for a special booster sample in Scotland. * * * *

Questions on respondents' voting histories have been asked in all surveys. Normally at least two previous

elections have been covered. In addition, between 1963 and 1969 questions were asked about the first election in which the respondent voted where this was different from the two previous elections. The precise

question wording changed of course from year to year and in order to save space the voting history questions

have been summarised in the following table. The general format of the previous vote questions was as follows:

THE SURVEY OF THE MAY 1979 GENERAL ELECTION - THE SURVEY DESIGN THE SAMPLE AND THE FIELDWORK, WITH A NOTE ON SAMPLING ERROR

This book focuses upon the May 1979 election and most of the data are drawn from the national interview survey conducted after that election. The 1979 survey is, however, also part of a series of surveys directed by the British Election Study at the University of Essex from 1974 to 1979. These surveys, furthermore, are in many ways a continuation of a previous series of surveys covering the general elections from 1964 to 1970 conducted by David Butler of Nuffield College. Oxford and Donald Stokes, then at the University of Michigan. The research project at the University of Essex was started in 1974 with Ivor Crewe and Bo Särlvik as directors; in 1975 the project was joined by David Robertson as a third director of the project. The project is funded by the Social Science Research Council; the University of Essex has made an important contribution by providing computing facilities and computing time, office space and administrative support.

The series of surveys include national interview surveys after each of the two general elections of 1974, a mail questionnaire survey conducted after the referendum on Britain's membership of the EEC in June 1975 and, finally, the May 1979 election survey.

The basic sample of respondents was drawn from the 1974 electoral registers and consisted of 3,400 individuals in a sample of constituences in Great Britain (Northern Ireland is not included in these studies). As far as was possible the individuals in this sample were contacted again for interviews in the October 1974 survey, by mail questionnaires in the 1975 referendum study, and for interviews in the 1979 survey.

A survey study which consists of 'waves' of interviews with the same sample of individuals at different points of time is known as a panel study. The obvious advantage of a panel study is that it becomes possible to study individual change over time in depth. The disadvantage is that the panel sample remains the same, whilst the population - in our case the electorate - changes because of mortality, the entry into the electorate of new age cohorts and residential mobility. Each of the interview surveys in the British Election Study series was therefore designed as a combination of a panel study and a survey covering a representative cross-section of the electorate at the time of each election. Already by the October 1974 election the sample was supplemented so as to include voters who had reached voting age since the election in February 1974. By 1979, a sample of names drawn from electoral registers in 1974 was obviously out of date as a representative cross-section of the electorate. It was therefore necessary to combine the panel component of individuals in the original 1974 sample with an additional component of individuals selected so as to ensure that the 1979 sample as a whole would form a representative cross-section of the electorate in that year. The sampling technique used for that purpose is described in the next section.

The data base generated by our series of surveys thus contains two types of samples : one representative cross-section sample for each of the three elections in February 1974, October 1974 and May 1979, as well as panel samples consisting of individuals who were interviewed in two or more of these surveys. The purpose of this Technical Paper is only to provide the information about the surveys that may be of interest to readers of the investigators' publications and for those who want to use the data for secondary analysis.

In accordance with the conditions for the grant awarded by the Social Science Research Council (SSRC), the data sets yielded by these surveys are deposited with the SSRC Survey Archive at the University of Essex. The data sets are made available through the Archive for further analysis in scholarly research. The Archive also supplies code books and other documentation needed by secondary users.

The interviews for the May 1979 election survey were carried out by Research Services Limited. The cross-section survey fieldwork in the February 1974 election study was conducted by British Market Research Bureau (BMRB), while Social & Community Planning Research was in charge of the fieldwork for the October 1974 election study. The British Election Study group at the University of Essex wrote and designed the questionnaires for all of these surveys and was also actively involved in the drawing of samples, monitoring of fieldwork and briefing of interviewers in collaboration with the fieldwork agencies. Coding of the questionnaires, data preparation and all the analysis was carried out at the University of Essex.

2. The Sample Design

The sample of individuals for the February 1974 election survey was based on BMRB's 'Master Sample' of 200 constituencies. The 618 constituencies south of the Caledonian canal were grouped into 11 regional strata (standard regions). Within each region. constituencies were divided into three groups: conurbations, urban areas, and rural areas. Within each area group constituencies were arranged in descending order according to the percentage Labour vote in the 1970 general election. Using this list, the 200 constituencies were selected systematically within regions with probability proportionate to population size. Within each constituency, one polling district was selected, likewise with probability proportionate to population size. Within each polling district 17 names were drawn from the electoral register through systematic sampling. The procedure was designed so as to yield 3,400 individuals forming a representative cross-section sample of the electorate.

For the reasons already given, this sample of individuals could not by itself form a representative sample of the 1979 electorate. The electorate had changed in the intervening five years because of the entry of electors who had come of voting age since 1974, and because of mortality and migration. The sample needed to be supplemented so as to include electors who had become eligible to vote since 1974 and so that it would reflect the changes caused by residential mobility and new building development during that period. Conducting fieldwork with a five year old sample also involves a practical problem. Many of the respondents in the 1974 sample would have moved to new addresses by 1979. It was known from previous experience that a substantial proportion of these persons would prove impossible to trace and that one could expect a very high fieldwork cost for the relatively small number of successfully completed interviews with those movers who could be contacted at new addresses.

To overcome these problems it was decided to adopt (with modifications) a sample design for long-running panel studies which had already been employed by Research Services Limited.¹⁾

Essentially, the 1974 sample was treated as a sample of addresses in the 1974 register, although the individuals in the 1974 sample were always included in the 1979 sample if they still lived at their 1974 address. A supplementary sample was furthermore drawn from the 1979 electoral register for the same polling districts (or their nearest geographical equivalent if boundaries had been changed). The addresses thus obtained were compared with the 1974 register. Those that already existed as household addresses in 1974 were deleted and those remaining therefore constituted a supplementary address sample of new housing in the district. As a part of this procedure one person at each supplementary address was selected as a respondent in the 1979 sample.

The addresses in the 1974 sample together with the new supplementary sample formed our 1979 sample of addresses. For each of these addresses was compiled a list of the persons who were living at the address and eligible to vote at the time when the appropriate electoral register was established. These lists were transcribed on fieldwork forms used by the interviewers; the forms had one line per person on the list and a number of blank lines for additional names. The interviewers first task at the contacting of an address was to update this list by deleting names of persons who no longer lived at the address and by adding the names of electors who had come of age

since 1974 or had moved into the dwelling since that time. (Obviously this would often mean that an entirely new household had replaced the one that lived at the address in 1974.) On the forms for 1974 addresses the line for the 1974 respondent was always marked with an asterisk. As explained above, the procedure when the 1979 supplementary sample was drawn was such that one person at each such address was selected as a respondent in the sample and this was also indicated by an asterisk on the appropriate name. Asterisks were furthermore placed against three of the blank lines on which the interviewers were instructed to write additional names if appropriate. The intervals between the lines with asterisks was determined by the sampling procedure. The interviewer was instructed to interview each of the persons whose names were written on a line with an asterisk, provided that the person was still living at the address. Thus persons in the 1974 sample of individuals were interviewed whenever possible, and the same was the case for one preselected person in each household on the addresses in the supplementary sample.

In addition, newly enfranchised persons and new residents were included if their names were written on a line with an asterisk. It should be noted that in some instances more than one person at the same address could be interviewed (however, the number of such cases is not large).

The effect of this procedure was, firstly, that panel individuals who had moved away from an address could be replaced by a new person living at the address and, secondly, that voters at 1974 households who had reached voting age, as well as any new inhabitants at our sample addresses had a predetermined probability of being included in the sample.

The sample of addresses over-represented households with a larger number of electors in comparison with small households (in proportion to the size of the household); this bias was corrected by adjusting the intervals between the asterisks accordingly. This enumeration method thus ensured that the 1979 cross-section sample was representative of electors who had moved into the sample addresses and also of members of the 1974 households who had come of voting age after that year. The endresult of this procedure was to generate a self-weighted crosssection sample of the 1979 electorate, which included a panel component of electors who still lived at the same address as in 1974.

Out of the original 3,400 names in the February 1974 sample, a total of 1,756 remained in the 'effective' fieldwork sample for the 1979 survey. Most of those excluded from the sample were people who had moved to another address (these were 'replaced' unless the property was empty or had been demolished, 232 persons had died, and there was also a small loss due to miscellaneous reasons such as failing to identify 1974 addresses. The sampling of the 1979 electoral registers yielded the direct selection of 198 names from the registers. A total of 1153 persons were added to the sample as a result of the enumeration made by the interviewers, either as replacements for respondents who had moved away, or as new voters in the household. The total effective 'in scope' sample comprised 3,107 individuals.

3. The Fieldwork

Polling day was 3 May 1979. During the days immediately before and after the election, interviewers were briefed at regional conferences about the fieldwork procedures and trained in the use of the questionnaire. Interviewing began on 5 May.

The fieldwork was monitored continuously, and interviewers were instructed to report back when they were unable to complete an interview either because the intended respondent had refused to participate or for some other reason. Whenever it was deemed justified, such addresses were re-contacted after an explanatory letter about the purpose of the study had been sent to the person to be interviewed. In total, 641 cases were re-issued in this way and interviews were obtained with about a third of these persons.

On average the interviews lasted for 78 minutes.

Well over one third of the interviews were done within a fortnight after the election, about 60 per cent by the end of May and about 90 per cent by 21 June.

4. The Response Rate

Not all of the 3,107 persons in the effective sample could be interviewed during the fieldwork. The 'loss' was caused by a variety of circumstances; some individuals refused to grant an interview, others said they were too busy on the occasions when they were contacted. In some instances, the person to be interviewed was never at home when the interviewer called (although a minimum of four calls were made), and there were also a number of respondents who were too ill, senile or incapacitated to be interviewed. About 60 per cent of the loss consisted of persons who were actually contacted by an interviewer but definitely refused to be interviewed.

The percentage of successfully completed interviews in different components of the sample are given below:

It should be noted that the response rate for persons whose names had beed added to the sample by enumeration of household members is based on the number of such names that the interviewer actually listed. This number of names is unavoidably somewhat lower than it would have been if all such enumeration had been complete and accurate in all instances. However, the interviewer could not always obtain the co-operation necessary to establish the list, and in other instances the list may not have been complete. We have no means of establishing how many names were missed in this way, but the efficiency in the fieldwork operation was such that it is not likely to be very big.

The response rate in the 1979 survey is less than in the two surveys conducted in 1974 when over 70 per cent of the effective sample was interviewed. There is some evidence that there has been a general trend over at least the last decade for response rates in large scale probability sample surveys to decline.²⁾ In the case of this study, the special sample design adopted in order to ensure that the sample would include a panel component had an adverse effect on the response rate in two ways. Firstly, it was more difficult to obtain interviews with individuals, of whom many had been interviewed on two previous occasions and had also been contacted in a mail questionnaire study. As the table above shows, it is amongst the panel individuals in the sample that the response rate is lowest. Secondly, the enumeration technique employed in this study involved a procedure which interviewers had to carry out before they could even begin to ask for an interview; sometimes the effect was to make it more difficult to establish the kind of rapport needed to persuade the intended respondent to grant an interview. These were the obvious drawbacks that followed from the sample design.

But the advantages are equally obvious. The sample provides the basis for cross-sectional analysis as well as for panel analysis. As will be seen in the following section, the 'loss' caused by non-response has not distorted the representativity of our sample of interviewed respondents to any serious extent.

As the purpose of the sampling procedure was to obtain a representative cross-section of the electorate, it is informative to compare the sample of interviewed respondents with the composition of the electorate. Such comparisons can be made with regard to certain attributes for which the distribution (in the appropriate age-groups) is known from census data. Other comparisons can be made with the aid of election statistics relating either to the total number of persons eligible to vote or the number of persons who participated in the election. Table A compares the sex and age composition of the crosssection sample and the national population in the relevant age-Table B compares the distributions across regions of groups. individuals who participated in the election in the crosssection sample and in the electorate as a whole. Table C shows the party division of the vote in the cross-section sample as well as in the electorate (excluding non-voters). In all these tables, the cross-section data pertains to the sample of individuals who were actually interviewed.

As is seen from these tables, the distributions in the crosssection sample coincide closely with those for the population and the voting electorate, respectively. As is almost always the case with sample surveys, the rate of participation in the sample of <u>interviewed</u> respondents is, however, higher than in the electorate as a whole. This is partly because some of the reasons for non-response (e.g., lack of interest, illness, being away from home during the period concerned) are also causes of nonparticipation in the election. The participation rate in the electorate (Great Britain) was 76.2 per cent. In the crosssection sample 82.3 per cent stated that they had voted, 14.3 per cent said they had not voted, and 3.4 per cent refused to disclose whether they had voted or not.

Further and more detailed comparisons between the electorate and the cross-section sample as well as the panel sample may be found in the British Election Study's <u>Technical</u> <u>Paper 1980:1 (A Comparison of Respondents' Characteristics with</u> <u>Known Population Parameters)</u>.

6. Sampling Error

A sample is intended to provide a microcosm of the population being represented. Not even a correctly drawn probability sample can be expected, however, to give an exact representation of the population (in our case, the electorate) in all regards. What is obtained when we calculate, for example, the percentage of the sample with a certain attribute is an estimate of the 'true' percentage for the population. Using sampling theory one can calculate an interval around the percentage obtained from a sample which is such that one can state, with a specified degree of certainty, that the 'true' value is within that interval. The degree of certainty is known as the confidence level and is stated in the form of a probability. In survey research the 95 per cent confidence level is commonly used; it means that there is a 95 per cent probability that the 'true' value is within the confidence interval given for an estimate.

The confidence interval for a percentage P is given by the formula :

confidence interval for

For example, if P is 50% and the value of the expression to the right is 2, then the confidence interval is 48 - 52%.

The letter d in formula (1) stands for the square root of the 'design effect'. For a simple random sample, the value of d equals 1.0 (that is, there is no design effect). The design effect will be discussed later.

The letter s_{θ} stands for the standard error of the estimate.

For a simple random sample the standard error is obtained by the formula :

$$s_{e} = \sqrt{\frac{P \times (100 - P)}{n - 1}}$$

The standard error will then be given in percentage units, as in the example above. In the above formula, P is the percentage for which the standard error is sought, while n is the number of individuals in the group of which the percentage is taken (i.e. the percentage base). The standard errors for P and (100 - P) are always the same; e.g., the standard error for 65% is the same as the standard error for 35%. As can be seen from the formula, the larger the size of the sample (n) on which the estimate is based, the smaller will the standard error become. The formula should also make it clear that the standard error (for a given sample size) is biggest when P is equal to 50% and decreases the more P differs from 50%.

The standard errors for percentage estimates based on a simple random sample are given below for selected values of P and sample sizes. The sample sizes chosen as examples actually include the numbers in the total 1979 sample, and the numbers of Conservative, Labour and Liberal voters rounded to the nearest hundred.

Our sample is a multi-stage stratified sample with a clustering of individuals in polling districts as primary sampling units. The clustering reduces the cost of interviewing very considerably. With a given budget for fieldwork costs, the sample could be substantially larger than that which would have been possible with an unclustered sample. The effect of a larger sample is to reduce sampling error. Stratification has the effect of reducing the sampling error. However, part of the gain from having a larger sample is offset by the fact that clustering increases the sampling error. The symbol d in equation (1) is a correction factor (normally with a value larger than 1.0) which corrects for the effect of clustering and stratification. In general, this will increase the confidence interval. (Actually, d is the ratio of the standard error for our sample to the standard error for a simple random sample of the same size). The value of the correction factor is not the same for all variables : it is higher for attributes that are unevenly distributed across polling districts (such as living in a council house) and it is lower for attributes that are more evenly distributed (such as sex).

Calculations of the value of d for selected variables based on the original February 1974 sample gave, e.g., a value of 1.4 for the per cent voting for a major party or the per cent belonging to the middle class, and a value of 1.2 for the percentage holding a certain opinion on the EEC. For other variables, such as sex and age group, it was approximately 1.0, whilst it reached the value of 2.0 for the percentage living in a council house.³⁾ The value of d is also affected by the size of the subsample on which an estimate is based. Calculating the correction needed for design effect is therefore a complex matter. The reader who wants to have an idea of the appropriate confidence interval for a particular estimate is therefore advised to multiply the standard error for a simple random sample (as given in the table) by 2.8 rather than 2. For that purpose it should in general be sufficient to use the standard error for the nearest percentage and sample size given in the table above.⁴⁾

In much of the analysis of survey data one is concerned with differences between groups in the sample. A table showing the relationship between two variables often comprises an array of groups which can be considered as ordered according to some criterion. The relationship between such a classification and a second variable can, for example, take the form that the proportion having a certain characteristic increases in a regular fashion from one group to the next.

The question that must then be asked is whether there are sufficient grounds to infer that such a difference of relationship also exists in the population from which the sample was drawn. If this is the case, then the observation made about the sample is considered statistically significant. This does not, it should be noted, mean that it is necessarily substantively significant or interesting. Statistical significance indicates only that one has established a basis for making inferences about the population - at a specified confidence level. It goes beyond this scope of this brief note to present the various methods of significance testing that can be used. Suffice it to say that the correction for design effect discussed above needs to be applied also, e.g., when testing the significance of a difference between two groups with regard to the percentage in each that has a given characteristic.⁵

5) If the percentages with a given characteristic within two sub-categories in the sample are different, the significance of that difference can be tested by :

 P_1 and P_2 are the percentages concerned, n_1 and n_2 stand for the number of individuals in the two groups respectively. The symbol d is the correction for design effect. 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THE MAY 1979 GENERAL ELECTION STUDY QUESTIONNAIRE

This Technical Paper from the British Election Study at the University of Essex contains the Questionnaire used in the national interview survey of the May 1979 General Election.

The British Election Study is a research project which is funded by the Social Science Research Council The study of the 1979 election continues a series of electoral surveys which includes interview surveys conducted following the elections in February 1974 and October 1974 and the referendum on Britain's membership of the EEC in 1975. Each of these studies was designed so as to comprise a representative sample of the electorate in Great Britain at the time of voting. With the sample drawn for the February 1974 election survey providing the basis, the study is at the same time a panel study so that a "panel core" of the sample consists of individuals who have been contacted in all of these surveys.

All the surveys were carried out during a fieldwork period following the voting day

The format and contents of the questionnaire were designed by the Directors of the project, Mr I. Crewe, Dr D. Robertson and Professor B. Särlvık. At the time of the final designing of the questionnaire and the fieldwork, the directors were assisted by Mr N Day, Senior Research Officer, and Mr A. Gordon as Research Officer At an earlier stage, Mr A. Fox and Mr W. Aughterson participated in the designing of the study and the questionnaire as Senior Research Officer and Research Officer, respectively.

The interview fieldwork for the 1979 study was carried out by <u>Research</u> <u>Services Ltd</u>.

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




VIEWS ON TAXATION AND GOVERNMENT SERVICES


VIEWS ON HOW TO TACKLE UNEMPLOYMENT





#### 1. THE BRITISH ELECTION STUDY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF ESSEX

The British Election Study (BES) at the University of Essex was started as a research project in 1974 to continue the series of election surveys previously conducted by David Butler and Donald Stokes. The Essex University project is wholly funded by the Social Science Research Council.

Mr Ivor Crewe and Professor Bo Särlvık have been Directors since 1974. Dr David Robertson (now at St Hugh's College, Oxford) joined the project as third Director in 1975.

The British Election Study has conducted interview surveys following the general elections of February 1974, October 1974 and May 1979. This series of studies also includes a questionnaire survey conducted after the Referendum on Britain's membership of the EEC in 1975.

At different stages in the project the Directors have been assisted by the following Senior Research Officers : Dr J. Alt (now at Washington University, St. Louis), Mr A. Fox, Mr N Day (now at Melbourne State College) and Mr R MacDermid.

Fieldwork for one or more of the surveys has been carried out by :

- * British Market Research Bureau
- * Social and Community Planning Research/Centre for Sample Surveys
- * National Opinion Polls, Market Research Limited/ Social Science Unit
- * Research Services Limited

In accordance with the SSRC grant conditions, the data yielded by these surveys are deposited with the SSRC Survey Archive at the University of Essex and made available to academic researchers for further analysis.

This paper contains a general description of the surveys carried out from 1974 to 1979. The BES Technical Paper series includes additional papers on methodological topics. Technical reports prepared by the fieldwork agencies contain further details about the samples and the fieldwork. Code books and supplementary information concerning the data sets are provided by the SSRC Survey Archive for users of the data.

* * *

As a research project, the British Election Study has four general aims .

- to collect data with a view to describing and explaining the outcome of General Elections,
- to analyse long-term changes of political attitudes and behaviour from the early 1960s to the present,
- 3. to organise and make available these data in a form suitable for a wide range of research.

Among the more limited, substantive concerns of the investigators, may be mentioned the magnitude and causes of the erosion of enduring support for the two major parties, the changing relationship between social stratification and electoral behaviour, the pattern and sources of short-term voting change, the divisions of opinions over major political issues and their relationships to the party division of the vote, and a continuing interest in the methodological advancement of survey design and analysis.

#### 2. THE SAMPLE COMPONENTS


The entire sequence of surveys has been conducted so as to yield data on representative cross-section samples of the electorate at each of the elections in 1974 and 1979 as well as a data basis for panel analysis comprising two or more elections.

An overview of the components in this survey series is provided by the Figure on the next page. Each of the surveys is described in the following sections


From the total data base, which includes more than 6000 individuals, the following analysis samples can be obtained -

- (1) A sample of the electorate eligible to vote in the general election of February 1974
- (2) A sample of the electorate eligible to vote in the general election of October 1974.
- (3) A sample of the electorate eligible to vote in the general election of May 1979.
- (4) A sample of the Scottish electorate eligible to vote in the general election of October 1974.
- (5) A panel of respondents originally interviewed following the general election of June 1970 and re-interviewed following the general election of February 1974.
- (6) A panel of respondents originally interviewed following the general election of February 1974, and re-interviewed following the general election in October 1974.
- (7) A panel of respondents interviewed following the general election of October 1974 who were contacted in a mail questionnaire survey after the referendum in 1975.
- (8) A panel of respondents originally interviewed following the general election of February 1974 and re-interviewed following the general election of May 1979.
- (9) A panel of respondents orignally interviewed following the general election of October 1974 and re-interviewed following the general election of May 1979.
- (10) A panel of respondents interviewed following all three general elections in February and October 1974 and May 1979.

#### 3. THE 1970 - FEBRUARY 1974 PANEL SURVEY

The sample for this survey was inherited from the 1970 Butler and Stokes election study. Originally 80 constituencies had been selected with probability proportionate to size of electorate from a list of 613 constituencies throughout Great Britain (excluding Northern Ireland and constituencies north of the Caledonian Canal). The list was stratified by region and by whether the constituencies were in urban or rural areas. Electors' names and addresses were drawn from the 1969/70 electoral registers of each of the selected constituencies. The sample for the 1974 survey comprised respondents who were interviewed in 1970, of whom about half had also been interviewed in 1969, respondents who had been interviewed in 1969 and who had moved out of the constituency between then and the 1970 wave were excluded from the 1974 sample. The total sample issue list for this survey contained 1,816 names, of whom 1,246 named individuals were found to be living at their 1970 address. In addition, it was decided to contact and interview respondents who had moved locally. This raised the number of named individuals contacted to 1,414. Interviews were obtained with 1,096 respondents.

Because the sample consisted of persons who had previously been interviewed and because the main function of this part of the 1974 study was to provide information about how opinions and behaviour had changed since the 1970 election, the subject matter of the questionnaire was similar to that of the questionnaires used in the 1969 and 1970 waves. The questionnaire began with a short section of questions about newspaper readership, politics and the media, followed by a series of open-ended questions concerning the political parties. Ten current political issues were covered · rising prices, strikes, and the miners' strike in particular, taxation, the Common Market, pensions and social sercurity, immigration, trade union power, big business power, nationalization, and control of wages and salaries. On the major issues, five aspects were examined : the respondent's own view of what should happen, his view of how the parties stood on the issue, the importance of the issue in his voting decision, his assessment of how well he understood the issue, and the party he preferred on the issue. On some issues, where there was thought to be a public consensus on what was desirable, for example, rising prices, only the last three aspects were examined. Other sections in the questionnaire covered voting behaviour at the general election, party identification and the respondents' overall assessment of the main political parties and the party leaders.

General questions were asked about the respondent's economic circumstances and expectations together with questions concerning trade union memebership and social class identification. The questionnaire was concluded with "social background" questions on occupation, marital status, income, etc. The interviews lasted on average some 45 to 50 minutes.

Fieldwork for this survey was conducted by <u>Social and Community</u> <u>Planning Research</u>. Interviewers were briefed by members of the Essex project group and SCPR executives jointly. The briefings were carried out in the week following the February election and interviewing commenced immediately thereafter. Most of the interviewing was completed within one month.

#### 4. THE FEBRUARY 1974 CROSS-SECTION SURVEY

For the second February 1974 survey a new sample of electors was drawn from the electoral register published in that month. For this sample 200 parliamentary constituencies were selected with probability proportionate to the size of the 1973 electorate from a list of 618 constituencies throughout Great Britain (again excluding constituencies north of the Caledonian Canal) The constituencies were stratified into eleven regional strata using the Registrar General's standard regional definitions and treating Greater London as a separate region Within these strata, constituencies were divided into three groups those in conurbations, those in urban areas, and those in rural areas, according to the proportion of that constituency's population that lived in each of these types of local authority areas Finally, the constituencies in these strata were arranged in descending order of the percentage of the Labour vote at the 1970 general election. The 200 constituencies were selected systematically within strata with probability proportionate to the size of the 1973 electorate. Within each of the 200 selected constituencies one polling district was selected, again with probability proportionate to size. This yielded a set of 200 polling districts as sampling units. For the February crosssection study individual electors were drawn within polling districts, in each case using a random starting point and sampling fraction necessary to generate seventeen names This gave a sample of 3,400 names representative of the eligible electorate on 28 February 1974. If one of these individuals had moved since the compilation of the electoral register in October 1973, interviewers were instructed to try to obtain

the new address. Interviews were attempted with all those for whom new addresses were established within the 200 constituencies covered by the survey In all, 2,462 interviews were completed.

The questionnaire used for the February 1974 cross-section survey was similar in many respects to that used in the 1970-74 panel study. There were, however, important differences between the two since there was less concern with the cross-section study of repeating questions in precisely the same form or, indeed, on the same topics as for the panel study More attention could therefore be focussed on those issues which were especially important in February 1974. For example, detailed questions were asked about the miners' strike, rising prices, and devolution There were also open-ended questions about what changes would result from the election and about the relative power of groups within British society More attention was also focussed on respondents' images of the parties, together with their general satisfaction with the political and social environment. The questionnaire was rather longer than that used in the panel survey and the average time was 70 minutes

Fieldwork on the cross-section survey was carried out by the British Market Research Bureau Interviewers were briefed jointly by a BMRB executive and a member of the Essex project group. The main part of the fieldwork was carried out between 8 March and 13 April 1974.

#### 5. THE OCTOBER 1974 CROSS-SECTION SURVEY

The October 1974 sample was an enlarged version of that used in February Four further names were selected in each of the 200 polling districts by using a random starting point and deriving the appropriate sampling interval. The original seventeen names were In all, 4,200 names were provided in 200 polling retained In the February 1974 cross-section survey, contact had districts been attempted with 3,400 electors; 2,462 of these were interviewed and 938, for various reasons, were not. In generating the effective sample for the October study all the contact sheets for non-respondents were studied, and individuals with whom it was felt no interview was possible were excluded from further contacting during the fieldwork. Reasons for exclusion included death, migration, firm refusal to be interviewed, etc., 789 individuals were thus excluded, leaving 149 names of previous non-respondents for issue in the October sample In summary, the issued sample in October was made up of three groups of individuals, there were 2,462 electors who had been interviewed in the February study ('A' series), 800 new electors whose names had been freshly drawn for October ('B' series), 149 electors whose names had been drawn in February who had not been interviewed then, but who might be available in October ('B' series) This gave an effective sample of 3,411 electors in 200 constituencies, 3,208 of these were contacted and interviews were completed with 2,365

Two colour-coded versions of the questionnaire were used Series 'A' respondents, those who had been interviewed after the February election, were given a shorter version lasting, on average, 65 minutes Series 'B' respondents, those who had not been previously interviewed, were asked to answer a longer questionnaire, lasting about 90 minutes. The shorter questionnaire omitted a number of background questions which had been asked of the 'A' series of respondents in the previous survey

The 'B' series questionnaire began with a short selection of questions about newspaper readership, politics and the media and the October election campaign. The next section in both the October versions consisted of open-ended questions probing the respondents' views about the political parties, including the Scottish National Party in Scotland. This was followed by a series of questions designed to tap by means of semantic differentials, respondents' images of the Conservative, Labour, and Liberal Parties. In the next section ten issues were covered. Eight issues were common to both the February and October election surveys : rising prices, strikes, pensions, membership of the Common Market, nationalization, social services, and wage controls. New issues in the October survey were unemployment, housing, and North Sea Oil In general the five aspects of issues which had been covered in the February surveys were examined (see Section 2). The section on major issues was followed by two new series of questions. The first was concerned with respondents'reactions to changes that had been taking place in Britain, such as attempts to ensure equality for women and for coloured people, tighter police control of demonstrations, the reduction in Britain's military strength, etc. The second series, was concerned with respondents' views on a number of policy proposals such as the establishment of comprehensive schools and aid to developing countries. These two series of questions were followed by questions on the most important general aims of government and questions on how much confidence could be placed on the parties' general handling of the problems of governments.

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A following section covered voting behaviour at the general election and political interest, together with a new series of questions pertaining to strategic voting This led on to a section on general party support, followed by questions probing respondents' attitudes to coalitions as an issue in their voting choice, followed by assessments of the main political parties and their leaders, together with a section on political party membership, interest group involvement and awareness of the winning parties and candidates' names. These were followed by questions on the respondents' financial circumstances and expectations and a section on social indicators in which respondents were asked how satisfied they were with their lives, jobs and politicians in Britain today. Finally occupation, marital status, income and date of birth were asked on all respondents, together with new questions on religious affiliation and the number and age of children in the household.

Fieldwork for this survey was conducted by <u>Social and Community</u> <u>Planning Research</u> Interviewer briefings chaired by SCPR researchers and members of the British Election Study project group, were conducted in the week following the general election. Interviewing began immediately after the briefing sessions. Throughout it was assumed that movers would be followed and interviewed where possible. Over 90% of all interviews had been conducted by 20 December 1974. Most of these took place in the first month after the election.

#### 6. THE FEBRUARY - OCTOBER 1974 PANEL SAMPLE

The 1974 cross-section surveys continued the pattern established by the Michigan Studies in the United States and by Butler and Stokes in Britain of combining cross-section surveys with panel elements. Those interviewed in the February cross-section survey who were subsequently interviewed after the October election - that is, the October 'A' series of respondents, produced a new 1974 panel sample The details of sampling, questionnaire construction and fieldwork given for the cross-section survey also apply to the panel element. Of the 2,467 respondents interviewed in February, 2,359 were subsequently contacted after the October election, and of these, 1,830 were interviewed.

#### 7. THE SCOTTISH STUDY

The October 1974 Scottish Survey was undertaken in order to make possible a more detailed study of the special and fast-changing pattern of Scottish electoral politics. Seven seats were won by the SNP in the February 1974 election, six for the first time, the SNP's average poll was 22 per cent, slightly above that of the Liberals even in England alone, the Conservative and Labour parties secured their lowest proportion of the poll in Scotland since 1918 and 1931 respectively and they failed to come first and second in thirty-one out of seventyone constituencies <u>Dr William Miller</u> of the University of Strathclyede joined the project as a co-director for the Scottish survey

To avoid having to draw a sample of constituencies and polling districts in Scotland completely independent of the Scottish element of the British cross-section sample, a sample design was sought that would allow the latter to provide data for both the British crosssection sample and for a Scottish cross-section sample, even if the data had to be weighted. The design adopted was as follows all seventy-one Scottish constituencies (including on this occasion those north of the Caledonian Canal) were divided into three main strata according to area type. Conurbation constituencies (including those twenty contiguous constituencies forming the Clydeside conurbation), rural constituencies (those twenty that lacked a substantial urban settlement), and the remaining thirty-one constituencies, which were treated as urban. The conurbation and rural constituencies were then each divided into two strata according to the relative strength of the Labour vote at the February 1974 election. The urban consituencies were divided into three groups using the same criterion Within each of the seven strata constituencies were listed in order of the proportion voting Liberal or Nationalist at the previous election Electorates

were accumulated within each stratum and a sampling interval calculated so as to provide five constituencies per stratum A starting point was selected such that all Scottish constituencies already in the British cross-section sample were included in this booster sample. Constituencies were then drawn with probability proportionate to size. The selected thirty-five constituencies consisted of eighteen constituencies in the British cross-section sample and seventeen additional constituencies. In the original eighteen constituencies the ward containing the polling district sampled in February was used as a base and a second polling district in that ward was chosen with probability proportionate to size. Thus a total of seventy secondary sampling units were derived, eighteen of which lay in the British cross-section sample.

An additional 1,390 electors were chosen by selecting five further names at random in each of the eighteen polling districts belonging to the cross-section sample and twenty-five names at random in the other fifty-two polling districts. These electors were asked a third version of the October questionnaire (the 'C' series).

In summary, the effective overall sample in Scotland was 1,704 electors whose names had been freshly drawn for the October study as part of the British cross-section sample ('B' series), seven electors whose names were drawn in February but had not been interviewed, but who might have been available in October ('B' series), and 1,390 of the additional Scottish sample ('C' series)

Because the seven strata contained different numbers of electors and because an equal number of constituencies was selected in each, the final sample design was a disproportionate stratified clustered sample When analysing this data, weights need to be applied to off-set the effect of differing sampling fractions in drawing primary sampling points in each of the seven master strata, weights are also required to compensate for differing probabilities of selection between the two types of polling district described. Of the 1,704 names issued, 1,542 individuals were contacted and completed interviews obtained with 1,170 respondents.

For 'A' and 'B' series respondents in Scotland the same questionnaires were used as in the rest of the British cross-section study. The third version of the questionnaire, used for the 'C' sample, was Similar in content to that used for 'B' series respondents. However, it included a number of questions of special relevance to Scottish issues, for example on devolution, North Sea oil, religious segregation in schools and the Scottish Assmebly, which were either not covered in the other two versions of the questionnaire or were dealt with less fully For reasons of space certain other issues had to be excluded from the 'C' series questionnaire. Fieldwork for the Scottish Study was organised alongside the main cross-section survey and was conducted by Social and Community Planning Research. The Referendum study sample consisted of all those individuals previously interviewed after the October 1974 election The survey thus formed a second or third panel wave for all respondents, depending on whether they had been interviewed after the February 1974 election.

The mail questionnaire used was very brief. In addition to questions relating to voting in the Referendum it contained questions which were directly or indirectly linked to opinion questions about the EEC asked in previous election studies. Questionnaires were mailed on the day of the Referendum. Two subsequesnt reminder letters were sent to nonrespondents Finally an interview follow-up employing the same questionnaire was used to contact those who had still not responded. The mail survey was administered by the project group at Essex. The Social Science Unit of <u>National Opinion Polls Market Research Limited</u> conducted the interview follow-up. Eighty per cent of the sample responded by mail, a further ten per cent were interviewed (using the mail questionnaire) by telephone or through contact visits.

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The May 1979 election survey was similar to its October 1974 predecessor in that it was a combined cross-section and panel survey

The basic sample of respondents was the same as that drawn prior to the February 1974 election survey and consisted of 3,400 names in 200 sample constituencies. By 1979, a sample of names drawn from electoral registers in 1974 was obviously out of date as a representative cross-section of the electorate It was therefore necessary to combine the panel component of individuals in the original 1974 sample with an additional component of individuals selected so as to ensure that the 1979 sample as a whole would form a representative cross-section of the electorate in that year

In order to take account of any changes in the electorate due to mortality, residential mobility and new housing, a sample design for long running panels which had already been employed by Research Services Limited was adopted with modifications.* The end result of this procedure was to generate a self-weighted cross-section sample of the 1979 electorate which included a panel component of electors who were still contactable at their 1974 addresses.

The total effective sample comprised 3,107 individuals, 1893 of whom were interviewed. The 1979 sample design did not provide for

following up those persons previously interviewed but who had moved since 1974.

Further details concerning the representatives of the sample can be found in the British Election Study's Technical Paper 1980 1 <u>A Comparison</u> of Respondents' Characteristics with Known Population Paremeters. Additional Technical Papers concerned with the sample design, fieldwork and response rate, etc in the 1979 study are forthcoming

* * * *

The design of the 1979 questionnaire sought to carry over questions from the two 1974 studies, in keeping with panel design of the sample, while at the same time introducing as many new questions as constraints of length and format allowed

The questionnaire began with a short series of questions about attention to the media and contact with the political parties during the campaign. Although these questions were substantively equivalent to those in the October and February 1974 studies, they were newly designed to elicit more information, while being more compact in design than previous formats. The next section was comprised of open-ended questions probing the respondents' views about the three major parties.

One of the following questions pertained to information about leading politicians (it has no equivalent in earlier studies). The respondents were asked to identify the photographs and party affiliations of twelve politicans. Further into the questionnaire, respondents were asked to place on a scale of one to ten their liking of some of these politicians as well as their parties A new format for asking questions about political issues was used throughout the questionnaire. These questions dealt with several issues of the need for change in the political system, the level of taxation and government services, methods of creating employment, Britain's EEC policy, ways of improving race relations, how wage levels should be settled and whether trade union activities should be more strictly regulated. The questions were designed so that the respondents could agree in varying intensity with one of two opposing positions, or take a neutral position, on a given issue. As a result a 7-point scale of issue positions was obtained. Respondents were then asked where each of the two major parties stood on the issue. In follow-up questions, respondents were asked which party (if any) they preferred on the issue and how important the issue had been when they decided how to vote

A number of questions were naturally carried over from the 1974 Election Study. The issues dealt with in this series included prices, unemployment, law and order and strikes. In each case, the respondents were asked to evaluate how Labour had handled the issue and how the Conservative party would have handled the issue, as well as how important the issue had been in their voting decision.

Questions about the issues of nationalization and social services were asked in the same format as in 1974 (a 4-point "position scale") Respondents were again asked to indicate where the Conservative and Labour party stood on the issue and were also asked both the issue's importance in their voting decision and their party preference on that issue.

The section on major issues was followed by two series of questions designed in 1974. The first was concerned with respondents' reactions to a number of changes taking place in Britain, such as people challenging authority and attempts to ensure equality for women and coloured people The second series was also similar to that used in October 1974 It was concerned with a range of policy proposals and respondents were asked both whether they were for or against each proposal and how important they considered it to be Questions in this series not previously asked included bringing back the death penalty, stiffer criminal sentences, giving council house tenants the right to buy their houses, expansion of the nuclear industry, reducing the power of the Lords, and withdrawing British troops from Northern Ireland.

A number of other issues were also probed These issues included whether sex was a factor in the suitablility of an MP or Prime Minister, devolution, a short series of questions on Britain's economy in terms of how the respondent had been affected in the past and how he/she might be affected in the future, and whether trade unions or big business had too much power A new set of questions measured the extent to which respondents perceived that parties were willing to listen to the views of various sectors of the economy, (eg small business and trade unions). As might be expected, the role of the trade unions was explored in further depth, especially in relation to how they were performing for the country as a whole, and for their own members more specifically. The question of pay differentials was also examined in the 1979 questionnaire. These questions invited respondents to compare their own wages with those better and less well paid than themselves

Two batteries of questions, again asked for the first time in 1979, concluded the issue section of the questionnaire. The first of these was designed to measure the potential for protest by asking respondents how likely it would be that they would engage in various legal and illegal forms of protest in response to a government decision with which they strongly disagreed The second battery 20

probed expectations about future economic and political developments in Britain Respondents were asked whether they thought it likely that there would be a general strike, an increase in terrorism or serious race riots among other scenarios in the next ten years

The concluding part of the questionnaire covered various social background factors . eg respondent's and spouse's occupation, income and other measures of wealth Education measures, while having equivalents in previous studies, were far more precise as to qualifications. Perceptions of social class were also probed more thoroughly than in previous surveys. Questions concerning the respondent's religious denomination, father's social status, etc., were also included in this part of the questionnaire. One section of the questionnaire recorded past voting behaviour at both general and local elections, as well as party identification.*

Interviews in the May 1979 survey lasted for about seventy minutes.

Fieldwork for the May 1979 study was conducted by <u>Research Services</u> <u>Limited</u>. Interviewer briefings were conducted jointly by RSL Management and British Election Study investigators in the week prior to the general election Interviewing began immediately after polling day, and 92 per cent of all successful interviews were completed by the end of June 1979.

#### 10. THE 1974-1979 PANEL SAMPLES

The 1979 election survey formed the third wave of the panel begun in February 1974. Because not all individuals were interviewed at all three time points in February 1974, October 1974 and May 1979, the concluding wave resulted in three overlapping panels. those individuals interviewed following all three general elections, those interviewed in February 1974 and reinterviewed in May 1979, and those interviewed in October 1974 and reinterviewed in May 1979 (the February 1974-October 1974 panel has already been described).

The number of persons in the February 1974 - May 1979 panel totalled 866 out of the 2462 originally interviewed in February 1974, those in the October 1974 - May 1979 panel numbered 765 of the 2365 individuals interviewed in October 1974. The three wave February 1974 -October 1974 - May 1979 panel comprises 756 individuals from amongst the 2462 interviewed following the February 1974 general election.

Details about questionnaires can be found in the relevant descriptions of the cross-section samples contained in this document.

#### INTRODUCTION

This technical paper contains basic demographic and voting data concerning the cross-section and panel samples of persons interviewed following the May 1979 general election.

The panel study comprises the general elections of February 1974, October 1974 and May 1979 The total sample described in this paper is intended to form a representative cross-section of the 1979 electorate As explained on the following pages, one component of this sample was interviewed only in 1979 while another component consists of persons who were interviewed in at least one of the interviewer surveys that followed the February 1974 and October 1974 general elections Tn addition to the cross-section sample, the data-base therefore comprises, as subsets, three overlapped yet analytically distinct panel samples the three-election panel, the February 1974 and May 1979 panel and the October 1974 and May 1979 panel (We do not deal in this paper with the February 1974 and October 1974 panel This panel is described in the technical document for the October 1974 election survey )

For comparison with the entire electorate the tables relating to our sample are accompanied by tables for the population in the appropriate age groups Furthermore, the paper contains tables describing the party division of the vote and corresponding tables for the electorate An analysis of electoral participation in the sample and comparisons with the entire electorate will be presented in a separate document.

Section I compares the distribution of those respondents interviewed following the May 1979 general election, those respondents comprising a panel of individuals first interviewed following the February 1974 general election and reinterviewed following the May 1979 general election, those respondents comprising a panel of individuals first interviewed following the October 1974 general election and reinterviewed following the May 1979 general election and reinterviewed following the May 1979 general election and those respondents comprising a panel of individuals interviewed following all three general elections with known population parameters on age, sex, region and vote

Sections II through V present comparisons of cross-tabulations of age by sex, age by sex and region and vote by region amongst the population and with the various analysis samples.


#### ANALYSIS SAMPLES


At the close of interviewing following the general election of May 1979, the British Election Study completed a series of panel and cross-sectional studies of electoral behaviour which began after the general election of February 1974 The three waves of interviews yielded seven overlapping yet analytically distinct samples The overlapping occurs because some individuals qualified for inclusion in more than one panel. The following samples can be extracted for analysis.

- A. A sample of the electorate eligible to vote in the general election of February 1974
- B. A sample of the electorate eligible to vote in the general election of October 1974
- C A sample of the electorate eligible to vote in the general election of May 1979
- D. A panel of respondents originally interviewed following the general election of February 1974 and reinterviewed following the general election of October 1974.
- E. A panel of respondents originally interviewed following the general election of February 1974 and reinterviewed following the general election of May 1979
- F. A panel of respondents originally interviewed following the general election of October 1974 and reinterviewed following the general election of May 1979
- G A panel of respondents interviewed following all three general elections
